During an afternoon of combat and courtesy, challengers chose their opponents and field of honor from a selection of four: combat at the barriers, combat of counted blows, three-man melees, and normal SCA combat. A board of Lady judges chose three champions of outstanding prowess and chivalry that afternoon; congratulations to Badger Strongmeadow, Angus Moihre, and Seamus MacQuarrie, who were given pastecrown prizes made by Alys Katherine.

Côte Nord sponsored a fencing tournament which was won by Milo Baxtor McDuff of Tyrnewydd. Sarah of the Erie Sea marshalled, with great assistance from Miguel de Servesa, while Kayleen Wakei managed the list table and Cailean Bane MacDougal heralded.

Edward Fitzranulf and Alys Katherine judged a bardic competition during the afternoon, on the theme of the Pennsic L. It was won by Karl von Köln, for his marvelous composition (see page 3). Though other contestants were present, none dared challenge his masterful performance.

Thanks to a well-trained and organized group of heralds, all the scheduled activities were run with great pageantry. Pietro Niccolo d'San Tybaldo managed a large assemblage, including Broom, Cerdic, Karl, Cailean, Francesca, Elspeth, and Delbchaem.

In addition to the scheduled activities, there were many other diversions available. Downstairs were board games and merchants, Amicia and Montgomery ran children's activities, and Angharad provided dancing.

That evening Elizabella Marchant and Sarra Bossard provided a sumptuous midwinter feast of four courses, consisting of meat pies, roast pork with sauces, chicken and rice blancmange, spiced fruit and vegetables, pottages and soups, cheeses and breads, various drinks, and a delectable dessert buffet. # Awards: Getting and Giving

In the Society, awards are given to people as a way for the entire group of us to say "thank you" to a person who has helped make the Society more fun for all of us. Many different things could earn a reward: setting up tables at events, sharing good information about costuming, or kind and courteous conduct of any kind. Anyone can earn a reward, whether they've been in the Society for two weeks or two decades.

Awards are presented by the Crown, i.e. the King and Queen. However, the King and Queen cannot know what every single person is doing, so they depend on the rest of us to recommend people for awards. They are looking for recommendations from all of us, not just from people who already have awards. After all, the best person to know that Lady A. is going out of her way for new people is the new people she talked to.

When you recommend someone, you should write a letter directly to the King and Queen. Their addresses are inside the front cover of the Pale. If there are two different addresses, send a letter to each.

In your letter, you should clearly describe who you are recommending, and why: include their full SCA and mundane names (try to spell them correctly), as well as the name of their group.

Say which award you are recommending them for; if you're not sure which one, try listing the awards that they already have. Tell what they've done to earn the award. Be as specific as possible. "He's really helpful." is not nearly as impressive as "He's helped five new fighters put together armor, and holds fighter practices weekly at his house to teach fighting."

Include any information that will help design the scroll, such as persona information, things they like to do, etc. Say which events the crown is attending they are likely to attend in the next few months. Also say you are, including SCA name, group, and any awards you might have.

All of this will help the crown decide if what the person has done is worthy of an award, which award to give, and when to give it. It will also give the scribe some idea of how to design a personalized scroll.

The Crown may not present an award as soon as you think they should. If an entire reign has gone by, try writing another letter to the new King and Queen. You may have to repeat this process a few times before the Crown is ready to give the award

# Playford Corner

Argeers (First edition, 1651)

Meet all, take each other Wo. by both hands, two slips to the left, and two to the right, change places, turne your owne once and a half. Meet again, turne each others Wo. to your places, turne your owne..

Men change places. We. change places, set and turne S. We. change places, men change places, set and turne S..

Leade each others Wo. to the left hand, fall a D. backe and turne your owne. back all meet again, Set and turne S..

Men to to the right hand and back againe, the Wo. going to the left, turne each others We. We. meet and back, men go the S. Hey, and to your places..

Put each others Wo. backe by both hands, slip to the right hand; fall downe on the contrary side, set and turne S. Slip betweene each other to your places, put them backward, and forward by both hands, set and turne S..

One man cast off with the Co. Wo. the other following then they cast off the other way, the other following to your places. Then halfe the S. Hey, turne your owne, fall all a brest to the presence..
