## A Brief History of Hanukkah

- 1. Hanukkah begins this year at sunset on December 18 and ends at nightfall on December 26. It is not a religious holiday rather it is a minor festival, commemorating the re-dedication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem around 164 BCE. Greek ruler Antiochus IV Epiphanes had invaded the land two years earlier, ordered Judaism outlawed, had an altar to Zeus installed in the Temple, and ordered pigs to be slaughtered on that altar. A revolt, led by a group called the Maccabees, drove out the Greeks. Several sources allude to the events and the celebration, including the New Testament (John 10:22-23).
- 2. The eight days of Hanukkah mark the apocryphal miracle in which sanctified oil to re-light the Temple lamp was sufficient for only one

day, but instead lasted the eight days needed for new oil to be made. Each Hanukkah night, a candle or oil-based light is lit, adding one more each night.

- 3. The overlap with Christmas this year is coincidental the Hebrew calendar is based on the Lunar cycle. Compared to the modern Gregorian calendar, Jewish holidays shift around from year to year.
- 4. During the Middle Ages, drinking and eating for pleasure became an acceptable religious obligation during festivals. Pan-fried cakes were made as an association with the miracle of the oil these evolved into jelly-filled doughnuts (sufganiyot). The Ashkenazis (Eastern European Jews) went with latkes (potato pancakes)(mmm), while the Sephardim (Iberian) and Mizrahi (Middle Eastern) have their own preferred fried dishes.
- 5. A university professor has commented that Jewish immigrants to America raised the celebration as a kid-centered alternative to Christmas during the 1800s, in part mirroring the ascendancy of Christmas, which also increased in importance in the 1800s. Jewish leaders (particularly of the Reform movement) made effort to rebrand Hanukkah, and started creating children-oriented Hanukkah celebrations. By the 1900s, it started to become a commercial holiday like Christmas, with Hanukkah gifts and decorations appearing in stores, while Jewish women's magazines printed articles on holiday decorations, children's celebrations, and gift giving.

What could be more American? Happy Hanukkah!

## **Archery Practice During the Winter**

No need to keep your bow in cold storage until spring. Here are a few places where you can nock and shoot in comfort.

Ohio Archery Learning Center: 8051 Mayfield Road, Chester Commons, Chesterland - <a href="https://www.ohioarcherycenter.com/">https://www.ohioarcherycenter.com/</a>

- They're open Monday through Friday, 1 to 8 pm, and Saturday, 9 am to 8 pm.
- If there is space available, it's \$10 per hour ("Saturdays get pretty busy"). They offer quarterly membership for \$140. Sunday, the range can be available by advance appointment, meaning we can book a group for two hours at \$10 per hour each.
- Target bales can be moved to 30 yards. Period crossbows are permitted with no surcharge. Standard paper target faces are free.

### Parma Armory Shooting Center – 5301 Hauserman Road, Parma - <a href="https://www.theparmaarmory.com">https://www.theparmaarmory.com</a>

- Open seven days a week. \$18/hour, \$12/half hour. An extra \$5 is added if you're shooting crossbow.
- Furthest target distance is 35 yards. There's room for 4 on the line, if you're friendly....

### Ohio Premier Archery and Sports – 14980 S State Ave., Middlefield -https://ohiopremierarchery.com/

- Open Saturday, 9 am to 3 pm. Closed Sunday. Also open varying hours, Monday through Friday.
- A range pass is \$10 a day, first come, first served. There is no added cost if you leave the store and return the same day. Period crossbows are allowed.
- Maximum range is 20 yards, with seven shooting positions on the line.
- From the web page "When you miss our targets and hit the wall, we will provide you with a sharpie so you can sign your name and memorialize the shot forever! ...Or at least until we paint the wall!"

### Bounce Archery – 5676 Manchester Road, Akron - <a href="https://bouncearchery.com/">https://bouncearchery.com/</a>

- Open Tuesday to Friday, noon to 7 pm. Saturday, noon to 4 pm.
- Maximum range is 20 yards, with 16 lanes available. Period crossbows are allowed.

### Hunter's Outlet - 1320 OH-43, Mogadore

- Monday to Friday, 10 am to 8 pm. Saturday, 10 am to 5 pm.
- Cost is \$8/hour, period crossbows are allowed.
- This used to be the winter practice range for Brendoken, but several people have informed me that the owners are using half the lanes for storage space, so there are now only three or four lanes on which to shoot.

# 5 Questions for Cleftlanders - Forester Muldonny McVriw (mka Justin Brew)

### 1.) What was your first SCA event?

NOWM, 2012. I was only there for Friday, I showed up to get authorized in rapier. And fence in the torchlight tournament then I went home. It was a blast. I was hooked. NOWM continues to be one of my favorite events.

2.) You've received recognition for several activities - a Forester and Royal champion for archery, a squire and Baronial champion for heavy combat, a Baronial champion for rapier - how do you balance all of these? Do you consider any of them to be your "main" focus?

It's tough to balance, I've only done one Pennsic where I did everything. Fought all the armored, Fenced all the rapier, and did all the archery war points. It was exhausting but worth it. Now, I tend to choose what I want to focus on at an event or given day.

For my main focus I would say that has shifted throughout my career. Archery was certainly my main focus for my first few years. Then rapier for a bit. Now I am focusing on my path in armor.

3.) What's something in the SCA you'd like to do, but haven't yet, or don't have time for?

So many things! It's tough to pick one. But isn't that the SCA. I think music could be fun. I play mundanely and have picked up a recorder. I have also built a hurdy gurdy. It's just a matter of having time to practice.



One year for Better War Through Archery I put on an insanely complicated shoot. I wanted a window shoot. But not one like where we normally shoot at a window. I wanted us to shoot out of one. So I bought this roll of paper that was printed to look like a stone wall. And I spend hours unrolling it and cutting out enough arrow slits for the whole line. I put that up on the shooting line and you had to shoot through the arrow slit at the target. It was perhaps a bit too ambitious for my first tournament. But with some last minute ingenuity it worked out. And everyone loved it.

5.) Tell us about something awesome that happened to you at Pennsic.

It's challenging to pick out just one thing. And I think that's the magic of Pennsic. When you think back on it you don't think about how hot it was. Or the countless hours of grueling work it is to set up and tear down a camp. You think about the awesome times around the fire. You think about the awesome, epic battles you get nowhere else. You think about the awesome champions where everyone is the best of the best. You think about the awesomeness that is Pennsic.

### Random Period Object - Cleveland Museum of Art



Saint Nicholas of Bari; Venice, 15th Century, Carlo Crivelli

Size: About 43 x 16 x 2.5 in.

Oil on wood panel.

This item is not entirely random this month - it is an image of St. Nicholas, the inspiration for Father Christmas. St. Nicholas is the patron saint of children, but also of sailors, merchants, and others.

He was bishop of Myra during the 300s, but his remains were said to be taken to Bari, Italy about 700 years later. He is shown here dressed richly as a bishop.

Painting style was changing away from gold backgrounds and towards more natural landscapes. Crivelli, however, was more conservative and favored Late Gothic design, although he began to develop his own style. around this time.

### Grave of St. Nicholas Found

Reported in October, but included here for the December issue due to the obvious synergy, archaeologists in Turkey say they have uncovered the exact place where Saint Nicholas was buried.

While it was already known that his body was originally interred on the grounds of a fourth century church in Demre (then known as Myra), a town in Turkey's coastal Antalya province, the exact location was a mystery. The current church, called the Church of St. Nicholas, was built on top of that one in 520 CE, and Nicholas's body was stolen in 1087, both actions that obscured the site.

A group of "wise and illustrious men of Bari" conspired to break through the church's floor and steal the body away. This was while the area was under the control of the Muslim Seljuk Turks, so a group of merchants felt they were "saving" the saint's remains. They took most of the bones, but left the sarcophagus, which remains. The remaining bones were removed by Venetian sailors during the First Crusade.

Current excavations revealed the floor and foundations of the 4th century church. The discovery of a fresco and markings in the marble floor tiles led the researchers to believe that was where the sarcophagus was originally.

While not much is known of Nicholas's life, there are legends. For example, it is said that he resurrected three murdered children after they were pickled in brine, and that he got into a fist-fight at the First Council of Nicea (325).

However, it was the tales of how he gave away the wealth he inherited from his family to the poor and downtrodden that led to Nicholas being combined with other figures to form the legend of Santa Claus.
