taught on subjects ranging from Anglo Saxon language to tablet weaving to dagger fighting. A full rapier combat academy was held, as well as practices and authorizations. Heavy weapons fighters found plenty to do on the practice lists as well, with two class tracts just for them.

Dance, sewing and lecture classes ran from11am to 4:50pm; it was difficult to decide between classes with such an array of interesting topics presented.

The site was magnificent, with plenty of room for all the activities, and for attendees to find quiet places to sit and relax between classes. There were two kitchens available for cooking classes, a tavern-style room for brewing classes, a magnificent hall upstairs and an enormous gymnasium for combat activities. Dramatis Personae: Celeste Aylene Dougherty

As we draw to toward the end of my first year as Chronicler, I thought it fitting to interview the lady who gave me the job, our former Chronicler and quite a local character, Celeste. She exhibited her understanding of the Chronicler's chief pressures by submitting a long and ready list of answers to my questions.

When did you first get involved with the Cleftlands? Well, I first got involved in the Society in November of 1987. I was a senior in high school and working on a term paper for my English class. We could write about anything that we wanted and, due to my long-standing fascination with all things Medieval, I decided to write about the origins of chivalry and its consequent death. I was quite convinced that chivalry was dead in modern society. Jenny (Guenhwyvar) convinced otherwise and told me that I needed to meet the people in this group that she had joined. I interviewed Sir Theodric

(at the time, not yet a knight) for the paper and got a quote from Duke Sir Laurelen. At the time, however, I mainly attended meetings in Eastwatch since I lived in Painesville. Only on rare occasions did I make it up to Cleftlands meetings. It wasn't until the summer of 1991 that I started attending meetings in Cleftlands regularly. I then went back to graduate school and did not start attending Cleftlands meetings again until the summer of 1994. Oh, and by the way, I got an "A" on that term paper. My interest in all things Medieval brought me to the group and the very nice people that I met (such as Alda and Theo) kept me coming back.

How have your interests changed since then? I wouldn't say that my interests have changed, just grown over the years. My primary interest when I first joined the group was English country dancing and Russian dancing. My interests have since expanded to include Middle Eastern dancing and drumming and archery, among other things.

What offices have you held in the group? The only office that I've held in the Cleftlands is that of Chronicler. The most that I can say about my experience as Chronicler is that it takes a lot of help and cooperation from other members of the Barony to put out a good newsletter on a regular basis and I appreciate all of you who helped me out, such as Grace, Marie, Gaffer, Conrad, Ephraim, and Calum, just to name a few.

How did you join up with the Goat Clan? My membership in the Goat Clan is again thanks in part to Jenny. They took her under their wing at Pennsic 18. I did not meet them until Pennsic 19, my first Pennsic, and they adopted me into the "family tree" at Pennsic 20. They decided to adopt me after I showed up five days in

a row wearing the exact same color garb as one of the men in the household. This probably would not have been so odd had the colors not been light turquoise, screaming fuchsia, bright purple, gray, and black. Once they saw that, they decided that I was clearly Neal's hermaphroditic twin and MUST be added to the family roster.

Who are these Goat people, anyway? The "Goat Clan" started camping together at Pennsic 14, but did not acquire the name Goat Clan until Pennsic 15. They received their moniker after a lord Orion introduced them to

Wearing these little plastic goats dangling off their ears, belts, and glasses seemed like a really good idea at the time, thus, the name. The core of the household is located in Columbus, Ohio, but the household in its entirety stretches from Ottawa, Ontario down to Orlando, Florida and over to Chicago, Illinois. Notable Goats from outside of Cleftlands include Tofi, Baron of Barony March Debatable Lands (BMDL) and Countess Elina,

When I think of you, I think of Middle Eastern dance, costume, and drumming . . . when did you start exploring Middle Eastern things?

9/8 rhythm) immediately since it took him about three months to master it. But, as I pointed out to him, I had an unfair advantage since I studied classical music for 12 years. Durr's also the one who gave me my Middle Eastern name which means, "she who outshines the sun." If you'd ever like me to explain the private joke involved in my name, come see me sometime.

How has your experience with Middle Eastern culture changed your experience with the SCA? I would say, if anything, it has opened up a whole new world of culture and history to me. The customs, societal norms, and modes of dressing of Middle Eastern people are quite different from our Western society and make for fascinating study.

What one thing would you like to tell the Barony now that you have their attention? Volunteer at Pennsic! In fact, I know this nice air-conditioned trailer where you can go to volunteer to get out of the steamy afternoon heat.
