### News of the Realm

Their Majesties have announced that a virtual court will be held to continue business of the Realm. Please join in on Saturday April 18 at 6:30 EST. Hosting platform to be announced.

Their Royal Highnesses posted a video to announce that, unfortunately, Coronation is canceled. A small event (under 10 people) will still be held to coronate TRH, which will be live-streamed on May 2. Other Kingdoms have explored this option, including Atlantia whose coronation was streamed on YouTube on April 4..

Midrealm Crown Tournament is still expected to be held on May 23. Further determination will be made by the Kingdom and Society closer to the event. If Crown Tournament cannot be held at that date, the plan is to postpone it.

SCA membership - During the mandated quarantine period, membership expiration dates of March 2020 onward will not be considered lapsed, and newsletter access will still be available. This means if your membership would have expired during the quarantine period (however long that turns out to be) your membership will show as active in the database. If you have subscriptions to *Tournaments Illuminated* or *Compleat Anachronist* you will need to contact membership@sca.org to extend the subscription. ## **5 Questions for Cleftlanders**

### Meet Badger Bagbane (mka William Lahman)

What are your two main activities in the SCA? If I had to pick two, they would be fencing and recovery. When I dropped out for 20 years due to living in a beer bottle, fencing was something new and was getting a lot of push-back. When I got back in 5 years ago, I was amazed to see the amount of fencing that was done. People who I remember looking down and nay-saying that it would never take off, were themselves fencing. It is a great sport because someone my age can go toe-to-toe with someone much young-

er. It is easier on the body than heavy and I am not

coming back with as many bruises as I used to.



The main reason I got back into SCA was my recovery from drinking. As an alcoholic, I need something in my life to keep me occupied. Dropping out was one of the worst decisions I made. I left a lot of friends. When I say, 'left' I mean that I didn't lose them. When I came back most welcomed me with open arms. I am very active in recovery because the SCA is more than just putting on funny clothes and drinking at night. I attended Pennsic 8 months after I became sober. Several people asked me if I had any trouble? I looked at them and said, 'Why'? I will admit my last Pennsic was one filled by a lot of alcohol. I didn't do much other than drink. When I went to Pennsic, I discovered that those "fun parties" weren't that much fun. It was basically a lot of drunk people slurring their words. I did discover that there are a lot of other parties, while not as booze-filled, were more fun and interesting. I started the 'Recovering SCAdians' group as a means of networking people who are also in some sort of recovery. It is a way to make sure that if you are having issues at an event, there might be someone you can talk to.

#### Who introduced you to the SCA?

Robert de Cleftlands introduced me, you can blame him. It was the spring of '82 and Robert was down at University of Cincinnati. He ran into this medieval group. Robert was part of the D&D group from high school. Since I couldn't get a date for my prom, I decided to spend that weekend down there and go to the Barony of the Flaming Griffin's baronial championships. That was my first event ever.

#### What makes Cleftlands special?

I feel like Rip Van Winkle. 20 years makes a huge change. When I left, to do research, you still had to write to museums or universities. There was no access like there is today. ## Crafting in Quarantine - Blow the Dust Off That Recorder!

Many of us have period instruments that we don't get to play as much as we'd like. If you are looking for a constructive way to use your time during the coronavirus hiatus, and you have a neglected recorder around the house, I suggest dusting it off and learning to play it.

The recorder is the perfect entry-level instrument for period music. Here are some reasons why:

- The recorder is period. Fourteenth-century recorders survive from Gottingen, Germany; Esslingen, Germany; Tartu, Estonia; and Nysa, Poland.
- It's affordable. You can get a good-sounding plastic Yamaha soprano recorder on Amazon for less than \$25.
- It's easy to play; all you need to do is blow! You only need to know about a dozen notes in order to play many simple period tunes.
- If you played music as a youth, all that knowledge is still in your brain promise! You'll be surprised how many aspects of reading music you'll recall.

The recorder is part of a family of woodwinds known as fipple flutes or internal duct flutes; these are whistle-like instruments. The family of instruments includes the tin whistles. The mouth of the recorder is made of a wooden plug, called a block or fipple, and it has a window or labium.

What distinguishes the recorder from other flutes is that the recorder has holes for seven fingers and one for the thumb of the uppermost, or left, hand. The lowest one or two holes are doubled to make it easier to play low semitones. Recorders also have a slightly tapered bore, with its widest end at the mouthpiece.

The recorder achieved great popularity in the 16th and 17th centuries. This development was linked to the fact that art music was no longer the exclusive domain of nobility and clergy. The advent of the printing press made it available to the more affluent commoners as well. During the Renaissance musical instruments were principally used in dance music and as accompaniment for voices. During the 15th century, instrument makers began producing choirs (or consorts) of recorders and other instruments in many sizes.

Recorders were played in consorts, or groups of musicians playing the same type of instrument, and families of instruments of various sizes. For recorders, this meant the sopranino, soprano, alto, tenor and bass, from highest-pitched to lowest.

Ready to become a recorder player? Here are some tips and links to get you started:

If you don't already have one, you need to buy a soprano or alto recorder. The alto is a big larger, has a deeper tone and is more expensive than the soprano. The soprano and alto have different fingerings for the same note. Most people concentrate on learning one or the other when they are starting out.

Now you need a fingering chart that will tell you how to finger the notes. One will come with your recorder, or look online for one that suits you better. The soprano and alto fingerings are usually on the same sheet.

#### Pro practice tips:


- Choose the same time every day. Choose a time that fits with your natural rhythms. If you're not a morning person, don't try to practice at 8 am.; it's probably not going to happen.
- It's OK to do a short practice if that's all you have time for. Something is better than nothing. Try longer practices on the weekends.
- Start a practice journal to keep track of when you practice.
- Set a goal. It might be to play one song for your spouse or friend in one month's time.
- Lastly, please feel free to turn to me, or the other members of the Northern Oaken Recorder Ensemble for help. Our members are happy to give advice, and we love welcoming new members.

Now start making music!
